

## Office for Students requirements

The Office for Students has set out their regulatory views concerning blended learning, based on research conducted by a panel of experts in 2022. Their report lists a series of circumstances under which OfS may have regulatory concerns based on two conditions, called B1 and B2:

**B1:** The provider must ensure that the students registered on each higher education course receive a high quality academic experience.

**B2:** The provider must take all reasonable steps to ensure:

1. students registered on a higher education course receive resources and support to ensure:
  - a. a high quality academic experience for those students; and
  - b. those students succeeding in and beyond higher education; and
2. effective engagement with students to ensure:
  - a. a high quality academic experience for those students; and
  - b. those students succeed in and beyond higher education.

Several of these circumstances are directly relevant to curriculum design, and these are summarised here for convenience.

### Circumstances impacting Condition B1:

Concerns may be raised if your course

- Uses out of date lecture recordings
- Does not provide appropriate feedback to students
- Does not foster collaborative learning
- Does not consider changing expectations for digital skills
- Does not require students to develop practical skills
- Has an arbitrary blend rather than a designed one
- Has a blend driven by limited physical resources
- Is delivered in a way that results in low attendance and engagement
- Has a blend that is confusing or difficult to manage because of poor coordination between units
- Has too much online content for students to engage with effectively
- Has a blend that is not communicated clearly to current and prospective students

### Circumstances impacting Condition B2:

Concerns may be raised if your students

- Do not get adequate access to appropriate physical space
- Do not get adequate access to hardware, software, and IT infrastructure
- Do not receive support to develop appropriate study skills (digital and in-person)
- Receive poor quality online lectures
- Receive out of date online lectures
- Do not have appropriately qualified teaching staff
- Do not receive timely and quality feedback
- Are not supported in managing their timetables
- Do not receive resources and support appropriate to their needs
